If there is a need, I will make it known to you personally at church and I will never ask you to send cash by wire, mail, or any . other electronic means.

Here are some scams to be aware of to avoid them:

- Artificial intelligence scams.
- Scammers are using AI to clone voices, posing as friends or family. A . phone call will sound like a loved one in trouble, requesting money urgently. Kingsley suggests having a code . word with your friends and family to verify their identity. Also, hang up and call back a known number for the person.
- Romance scams.


- Be wary of any romantic interests or new friends asking you to send enforcement impersonations. them money, especially if you've never met in person. Never send money online or have never met in person.
- Tech support scams.
- your computer or phone saying there's a problem. Don't give remote access to your computer or pay any and some tips from USAA and Chase fees. Also, beware of fake emails that seem to be an invoice for something vou didn't order or a fake receipt for get you to click for more information.
 - Familiar bank or company impersonations.
 - Scammers will pretend to be from a reputable company to warn you about problems with your account or order. They'll try to trick the consumer into sharing personal or financial information. Don't pick up phone calls from • numbers you don't recognize or an- Kandoll swer unsolicited texts.

- Government lawor
- Scammers will pose as representto anyone you don't know well, met atives from the IRS, Social Security or law enforcement, demanding immediate payments or threatening lawenforcement action. The government will not call you to demand urgent ac-Don't fall for pop-up messages on tion or threaten you. In most instances, government officials will contact you by mail if there is a problem.
 - Investment scams.
- If something sounds too good to something you didn't pay for, meant to be true, it probably is. Caller ID can be faked. Always be wary of anyone asking you to send them money or give access to your accounts. If you get nervous that someone is attempting to scam you, tell them you have to go. Hang up and call the person or institution you thought you were talking to. (Note: Make sure you are dialing the correct number.)

It was hard to discourage Fanny Crosby. Joy was a characteristic of her life. When English hymn writer Frances Havergal asked someone about Crosby, she received the reply, "She is a blind lady whose heart can see splendidly in the sunshine of God's love." Crosby herself acknowledged, "Darkness may throw a shadow over my outer vision, but there is no cloud that can keep the sunlight of hope from a trustful soul."

Probably written in 1872, this song was taken to England by Ira Sankey, who led the singing for Dwight L. Moody's evangelistic campaigns. Billy Graham introduced this hymn in his Nashville crusade, and it became a popular hymn in America.
